Eduba were institutions that trained and educated young scribes in ancient Mesopotamia during the late third or early second millennium BCE. We named our training center Eduba because we are proud of our Mesopotamian heritage in education and we want to continue and advance it.

Introduction

In Iraq the lack of high-quality education and employment opportunities for the youth, compounded by insecurity, poverty and Covid-19 are halting the country's new generations and professionals to fully reach their potential and expand their capabilities, creating a negative and cyclical impasse that affects the overall communities and country's development.

Years of conflict and lack of investments in education have contributed to progressively dismantle what used to be the best education system in the region, curtailing the opportunity of children, youth and young professionals to access to quality learning and training opportunities for fully realizing their potential.

Recent data indicates that 3.2 million school-aged Iraqi children are out of school and the situation is especially concerning in conflict affected governorates and 50% of displaced children are out of school (approximately 355,000 children). In governorates such as Salah al-Din and Diyala more than 90% of school-age children are out of the education system,

and in general the situation is worse for girls, who are under-represented in both primary and secondary schools.

According to recent data poverty rates in Iraq hover at around 30 per cent and are significantly higher in rural areas, Iraq has one of the lowest employment-to-total population ratios in the region, even among men, of an estimated working age population of 20 million in Iraq, at least 2.5 million are unemployed. Almost a quarter of the working-age population is underutilized – either unemployed or underemployed. Iraqi women who do participate in the labour market are also more likely to be unemployed, under-employed or employed in part-time jobs.

Therefore, the provision of high quality and tailored training services based on the needs of local communities and requirements of the local labour market, plays a crucial role in ensuring that the youth and professionals have the necessary expertise, skills and knowledge to become part of Iraq's workforce, developing their own pathways and livelihoods while also positively impacting their communities and organizations, fostering a broader generational development in the country.



What is Eduba Center?

Eduba Center for Human and Organizational development is a specialized training center located in Baghdad and licensed by Ministry of Labour and Social Affairs (MOLSA). It is a subsidiary of Mercy Hands, the biggest humanitarian national NGO of Iraq, founded in 2004. Eduba Center's vision is to deliver high quality training services that allow trainees of all ages and genders to fully realize their potential gaining new skills and expertise, grooming a new generation of youth, women and professionals that will positively impact their communities, regardless of their personal characteristics and background.

4. The award winner trainer Duaa Falah, successfully conducted a Peaceful Coexistence training for Mercy Hands for Humanitarian Aid staff of the "Enhance the sustainable livelihood for vulnerable returnees and agriculture lands rehabilitation" project in Salah al-Din.

Participants learned how to improve personal relationships, build trust and overcome differences, creating a workplace made of harmony and respect through both theoretical explanations and group activities.



5. Eduba Center conducted a Gender Based Violence training for Mercy Hands for Humanitarian Aid staff in Salah al-Din, focusing on women's rights and the effects of GBV on women, but also on the communities and organizations in which they live and work in.

The trainer focused on the existing remedies to tackle this issue, and allowed the participants to expand their knowledge and sensitivity on this issue.

Eduba Center organized in Baghdad a Proposal Writing Workshop for all the national and expat staff of Mercy Hands for Humanitarian Aid.

The workshop was based on a learner-centered approach, and allowed participants to expand their theoretical knowledge of proposal writing, while also practicing their analytical and writing skills, thanks to an interactive session of SWAT analysis.

Moreover, participants interacted during all the activities and sessions, with insights and questions, and they also successfully drafted a Logical Framework, one of the most important "pillars" of projects.



10. How would you achieve peace in the world? Eduba Center's first ever International Relations Workshop in Baghdad.

During the Workshop the participants learned about and discussed the main theories and concepts of International Relations, through interactive and learner-centred activities. The participants learned about the main IR theories that explain the dynamics of war, peace, diplomacy and cooperation between states and other actors.
